Case Statement/Vision Statement

- Review and discuss final draft of Case Statement
 - Looking for: is the language clear, concise, and understandable? Is it impactful— does it move you? Would you endorse it?
 - <u>Link to Draft for TPC Review and Comment</u>
- Next Steps: send to 3-4 key stakeholders; after feedback/buy-in from first few recipients, will send to rest of identified stakeholders
- Feedback:

- Make sure we add a sentence or two in each phase about how this work will be done EQUITABLY. In Phase I: Sentence that calls out funds and work to rebuild relationship with agencies. Co-design with End Users--relationship re-building.
- Funding Needs: Short Term Solution for OC. How specific do we need to be about who will be the primary owner of this work. Will OC be the obvious curators or may it be an RFP for someone else?
- Would a story help? A direct quote from who we want to serve. Testimonials.
- Need to address staffing needed to navigate the database with/for folks.
- Where has this been done before? At this stage, just offering the confidence that this
 can be done through specific examples provides an element of clear, concise assurance.
 And we can shape the tools to serve our local community well.
- o How do we address the non-technology user--how do they access?
- End users who have hesitation or pause about being "in a system". They may not seek help at all if their information will be captured in a system.
- O CIE Part 3. Is there a realistic model that works?
- Ejas is a program and referral system that the state uses to make closed loop referrals with community partners (OC, ESD, DVSAS), and it does work in Whatcom. It should be possible to build something similar for our county needs
- CIE Models have worked out agreements for sharing, regulatory levels. San Diego has a working model that we are looking at how to scale across and improve.
- o Integration of service system via technology and services. Design would allow interface between multiple sources of information.
- We aren't making 1 door, we are making sure all those multiple doors connect to the same resources, and that is really a huge part of this equity design.

- Healthy Whatcom
 - o Effort that informs the Community Health Improvement Plan

 - Early Childhood focused for first sessions.
 - We are working with Results Based Accountability, which helps us "turn the curve".
